2. Invited guest lecture of external expertise has been organised through “Career Counselling and Placement Cell”.
3. The “Guardian-Teacher Scheme” is a unique practice of the college. In it, the college allotted 10 to 15 students to each staff member for supervision and counselling.
4. The college has started an innovative technique of teaching and learning through PPT, poster presentation, workshop, seminar and group discussion, field visit.

- To create awareness about personal hygiene and healthy co-education.
- To ensure overall development and security of girl students
- To provide a tool to develop moral education, life development skills, communications skills, new technological skills, to be economically capable in future.

3. The Context:

It is according to the National policy for empowerment of women and one of the aims, objectives and Goals of the Institute itself “To empower girl students and the women staff by establishing special Redresal / Counselling Cell”. The college ensures through its different activities the developing sense of gender sensitization and gender equality among all. In this regard the meeting of all students is conducted and to promote gender equality counselling from the expert is made.

- After counselling students are asked for suggestions on gender equality and women empowerment. Ample of suggestions are received in suggestion box.
- It becomes challenging to accelerate on all suggestions and hence five prominent suggestions were selected by selection committee and started its implementation.
- How to channelize the result oriented tasks was one of the challenges.

4. The Practice

To inculcate the Gender Equality among the students and society following activities have been planned and conducted by the college.

- The college has organized Student Meet to sensitization them toward gender equality, which was addressed by Principal Dr. A. P. Charjan. In this sensitization program, suggestions are received for inculcating gender equality and to change the secondary treatment to women in the society.
- A committee of students is formed to coordinate suggested activities under the campaign of ‘Jagar Janiwancha’.
- The stickers on Gender Equality have been posted at relevant places in the nearby locality of the college.
- The students interviewed the eminent persons from Society in the context of Gender Equality.

- The programme of taking pledge and awakening on Gender Equality has been organized.
- A lecture has been organized to convince the message of Savitribai Fule on Gender Equality.
- The poster / rangoli /essay competition has been organized on contribution of women and today's issue in society.

5. Evidence of Success

- The discussion of the group of students on the topic of gender sensitization and equality is held with highly renowned personalities in the society like Doctors, and the Professors.
- The news regarding the gender sensitization program and the articles were given for publishing widely through local newspapers.
- Disciplined atmosphere and gender sensitization among the students of the college is reflected and it is resulted into no major grievances were registered.
- These activities strengthen the gender equality among the students.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Students participation in the related program is poor.
- While surveying in the society on the issues peoples among the society were not eager to receive the information.
- The institute implements the issues on the Gender Equality and at the same time on the level of government it is not focused properly.
- For the purpose of gender sensitization, awareness of the same is needed to be made at public places, general government offices, social functions, etc.
- Special advantages in terms of marks at university level are required for the promotion of the gender sensitization.
- Special funds at Government and University level through the NCC, NSS and adult education program need to be provided.
- List of the Expertise in the field of counselling for gender sensitization through NGOs is to be maintained on the government websites.

- Free coaching for competitive examinations is started
- Co-education based courses in marketing management are proposed

- Inverter batteries are handed over to expert persons only for dismantling or recycling.

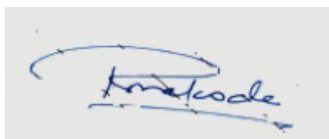
Student Feedback System (SWOC)
